## **Facts & Figures: 2000-2001**

**Founded:** 1930; Seeley G. Mudd Building completed in 1975

**Total operating budget 2000/01:** 4.3 million

**Staff:** 49 FTE including 15 professional librarians

**Staffing:** Open 96 hours per week; Information Services staffed 57 hours per week

**Collection:** 307,969 volumes including 2,809 current subscriptions and an outstanding Trent Collection in the History of Medicine; 1,467 electronic journals; 2,103 audiovisual items

**Total items added to collection:** 6,385

**Total number of primary clients:** 13,023

**Seating capacity:** 470

**Lending of items (external circulation):** 27,775

**Gate count:** 201,097

**Photocopies made by clients:** 1,767,584

**Net assignable square feet:** 47,526

**Reference services:** 28,767 questions were answered at the Information Desk and other service points.

**Interlibrary loan:** 5,966 items were borrowed; 24,215 items were lent to others (filled requests).

**Document delivery for items on campus:** 124 items requested for Medical Center clients from other Duke libraries.

**In-house photocopy services:** 3,631 articles copied.

**User education:** 2,283 clients attended 243 orientations and instructional teaching sessions.

**Self-service computerized databases:** Free access is available to the Ovid databases MEDLINE, CancerLit, Current Contents Search, Evidence Based Medicine Reviews, International Pharmaceutical Abstracts, Journals@Ovid Full Text, Nursing & Allied Health (CINAHL), PsycINFO, and SPORTDiscus. (AIDSLINE, BioethicsLine, and HealthStar data have been incorporated into MEDLINE.) Approximately 3,000 Medical Center password holders are currently registered to access this data through terminals in the Library and remotely. AMA-FREIDA, ISI Web of Science (Citation Databases), Health Reference Center, Alt-Health Watch, HIM (Historical Images in Medicine), Community of Science (COS), SPIN (Sponsored Programs Information Network), IRIS (Illinois Researcher Information Service), TOXLINE, Clinical Pharmacology, Harrison's Online, Scientific American Medicine Online, MD Consult, PubMed, and other databases are available for use via our Website at <http://www.mclibrary.duke.edu/>.

**Triangle Research Libraries Network (TRLN):** A partnership of the libraries of Duke, NC Central, NC State, and UNC-Chapel Hill for cooperative collection development, resource sharing, and technical innovation.
